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LETTER FROM SARAH

As the founder of Well Aware, I rarely pause to reflect on our impact over the past 15 years. But on this special anniversary, I think back to the very first well—and the little girl who changed my life forever.

In January 2010, I flew to Nairobi with friends after raising funds to drill a well in a Kenyan village. After days of travel and little sleep, we set off toward the rural community where the well was being drilled. The huge metal rig sent vibrations into the earth, and as we piled out of the van onto the dry soil, we could feel the ground humming beneath us.

Once we had taken it all in, we walked toward the nearby school and women's center, where a large gathering of women and children waited to meet us. We were embraced with warmth and joy inside the dilapidated building, their eagerness filling the air as they guided us through their village. As we walked, I noticed one little girl was always watching me. By that afternoon, she was holding my hand, following me wherever I went. She was tiny-I guessed age 4 or 5-but when she told me she was 8, I realized malnutrition had stunted her growth.

We were resting in the shade when a deep thud shook the ground. Jumping to our feet, we saw water erupting from the drill site. Her eyes widened as she screamed, "Maji! Maji!" (Swahili for water) and sprinted under the safety tape toward the gushing well. I instinctively ran after her, guiding her back to the safe area. She didn't understand at first, but the women nearby explained that it wasn't safe to drink yet. Later that day, one of the drillers waved me over, signaling the water was now safe to drink. I grabbed a bottle, filled it to the top, and lifted my little friend into my arms as I handed it to her. It was heavy in her tiny hands, but she drank the entire bottle in seconds.

I can still feel that moment—the relief in her body, the joy in her eyes. In an instant, I understood how life-changing this well would be—not just for her, but for her family and the entire village.

More children in school, fewer illnesses, and a future no longer defined by the search for water. Women in the community told me how much their lives would change. They could grow crops, earn their own income, and worry less about losing their babies to dirty water or dehydration.

It was then that I decided to devote my life to this work, and Mike and I were determined to do it better than anyone had before. Most water projects in this region fail, so we focused on understanding why and built a

model that would last. In the beginning, we had no large grant, no celebrity backing, no real resources, and, admittedly, very little understanding of water system infrastructure. What that small group of us who put it all into motion did have, though, was determination, the right people, and a commitment to doing right by each and every community we served.

Now, 15 years later, we have built a team of 15, and through it all, we remain guided by those we serve–especially the little girls.





Daraja Academy

NEW DEEP BOREHOLE

My name is Jecinta Ann Mwangi, Well Aware's Operations Officer. Mesret Endale and I attended Daraja Academy as girls, and the newly found partnership between Daraja and Well Aware means the world to us.

Nestled in the vibrant heart of Laikipia County within Nanyuki, Kenya, is Daraja Academy. This fully sponsored, all-girls boarding school empowers bright, underprivileged girls through a holistic approach to education. Daraja fosters leadership skills, instilling a sense of social responsibility and empowering us to become agents of change within our communities, nation, and beyond. Among the many lessons I learned there, one stands out most: the critical importance of water.



Water scarcity tested our resilience early on. I vividly remember my second day at Daraja, standing by the Ewaso Nyiro River—our school's primary water source—only to see its levels dangerously low.

A crisis was unfolding, forcing us to adopt strict conservation habits: using water sparingly, closing taps tightly, limiting flushing, recycling where possible, and reducing water for bathing and cleaning. Yet, despite our efforts, the river eventually ran dry, leaving us no choice but to find new ways to sustain ourselves.





In desperation, we turned to an old, shallow hand pump well, previously ignored due to its undrinkable water. It became our lifeline for washing, laundry, and bathing. We raced to the borehole every afternoon, knowing the slow-moving line could take hours. The physical toll was immense—aching muscles, sore hands—but we endured, driven by the undeniable truth: every single drop of water was precious.

The transition of Daraja Academy to its new campus marks a significant milestone in its journey of growth and empowerment. With this move, Daraja can accommodate double its current school population, reaching approximately 500 students and staff. And there is reliable, clean water.

With Daraja's commitment to education and Well Aware's dedication to clean water access, this collaboration will have a lasting impact. Installing a new well at the campus will provide a sustainable resource, improving health, hygiene, and academic success. It also reinforces the girls' deep-rooted commitment to water conservation, ensuring every drop is valued. Together, education and clean water will shape the next generation of leaders, proving that sustainable development starts with empowered communities.

I am deeply grateful to stand at the intersection of two life-changing organizations, Daraja Academy and Well Aware, bringing clean water to the very community that shaped me. Bridging my past and present in this role fills me with immense pride, as I know firsthand the life-changing impact of access to clean water.



COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT

Mutune Primary Girls School

RAINWATER HARVESTING AND PURIFICATION SYSTEM

Mutune Primary Girls School in Kitui County, Kenya, serves as an educational haven for 600 students—half of whom reside on campus as full-time boarders. However, the school faced a pressing water challenge, relying on the seasonal, untreated water from a nearby river. This water source was inconsistent and prone to contamination, putting students' health at risk. Reliance on an unsafe water source stems from the failure of previous water systems—a broken and abandoned hand pump and an unreliable rainwater collection system—leaving them with no other option.









Clean water is the foundation of life, and education is its most powerful catalyst.

For those at Mutune, clean water is not just about hydration and meal preparation—it's essential for daily life. Boarded students now have safe water for drinking, bathing, and basic hygiene, dramatically improving their health and well-being. Clean water has been proven to reduce disease rates by 68%, transforming entire communities.

As a women-led organization, we deeply understand the importance of empowering students—especially young girls—in developing regions. It was an honor to bring clean, reliable water to Mutune Primary Girls School last summer. When girls no longer have to fight for their basic needs, they can focus on shaping their futures. Together, we can build a future where water scarcity never stands in the way of opportunity.



COMPANY PARTNER HIGHLIGHT

A longstanding partner of more than 15 years, INTERA, Inc. has been critical in our success as an organization.

In the early days before our team was the size it is now, INTERA volunteers traveled with us to Kenya, ensuring our goal of implementing truly sustainable water projects was met with expertise and long hours of on-the-ground work. In the past couple of years, our technical team and INTERA have been hard at work making processes more efficient.





The INTERA Ron Lantz Stewardship Award, created by former CEO Marsh Lavenue in 2018, allows for a \$10,000 stipend and a one-month sabbatical for the winning staff member to contribute to a non-profit project of their choice. In 2023, the INTERA Ron Lantz Stewardship Award winner, Michelle Pedrazas, a geoscientist at INTERA, collaborated with Well Aware to implement practical geophysical survey methods for use in optimizing water well drilling locations in Kenya, improving the cost-effectiveness of Well Aware funds into the future.

By utilizing geophysical equipment and open-source instrumentation, Well Aware and INTERA are beginning to collect an extensive database of hydro-geological information that currently does not exist in Kenya, allowing for efficient and accurate identification of drilling locations. This initiative will dramatically reduce wait times—leading to more successful projects and fewer uncertainties during the drilling process. The partnership also involves collaboration with Colorado School of Mines professors Dr. Jeffrey Shragge and Dr. Rich Krahenbuhl to provide access to a low-cost direct-current resistivity meter designed for humanitarian geophysics applications, further enhancing our subsurface mapping capabilities.

Despite receiving up to 200 water project requests annually, our capacity to implement projects is limited. This partnership represents a significant step towards streamlining the process.

"Through this partnership and collaboration, we expect to complete 50% more groundwater well projects and impact 50% more people than with today's current resources – setting a new industry standard in the nonprofit water sector,"

To date, INTERA has impacted more than 10,000 people with access to clean water in East Africa, and with these new geophysical survey methods introduced by their team, INTERA's impact will live on for generations.







NONPROFIT PARTNER HIGHLIGHT

The Philanthropy Lab

In 2024, a group of bright University of Texas students were tasked with researching a nonprofit inside and out in hopes of awarding them a grant from the Philanthropy Lab. Once Well Aware was chosen as the focus organization for this group, headed by Morgan Locke and former intern, Anu Pillai, the students interviewed many people on our team to understand our project processes, marketing strategy, revenue plans, and long term growth plan. After spending a majority of the semester



researching our organization and putting together a pitch, they competed with their fellow classmates and won, resulting in a \$20,000 grant towards our clean water work.

Because their pitch of Well Aware won on the university level, Locke brought it to the Ambassador's Conference in Fort Worth, Texas last summer, competing against 38 groups from various universities. Well Aware won 1st place, resulting in an additional \$50,000!

This app allows community members to stay connected with water system diagnostics, project reporting, and expert support from the Well Aware team, most of which live in Kenya. It was this holistic strategy that set Well Aware apart for our board."
